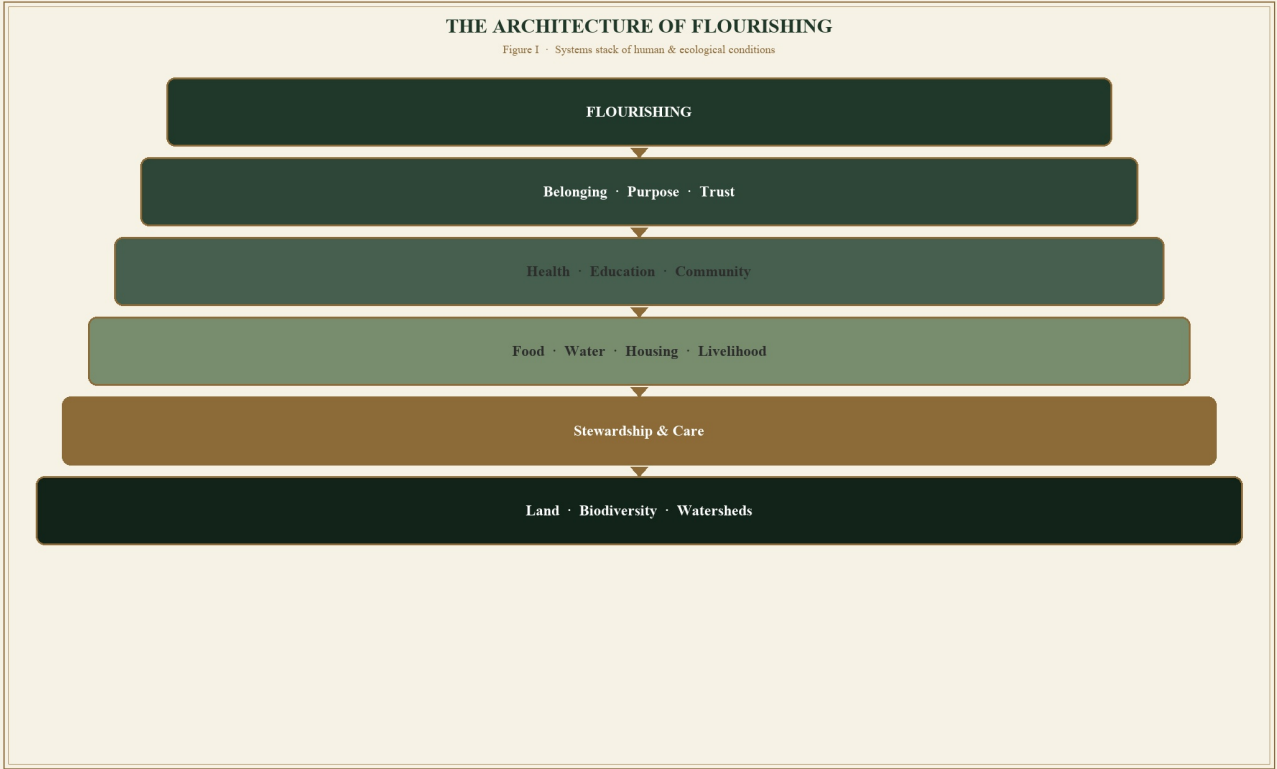

FIGURE — THE STEWARD'S CYCLE

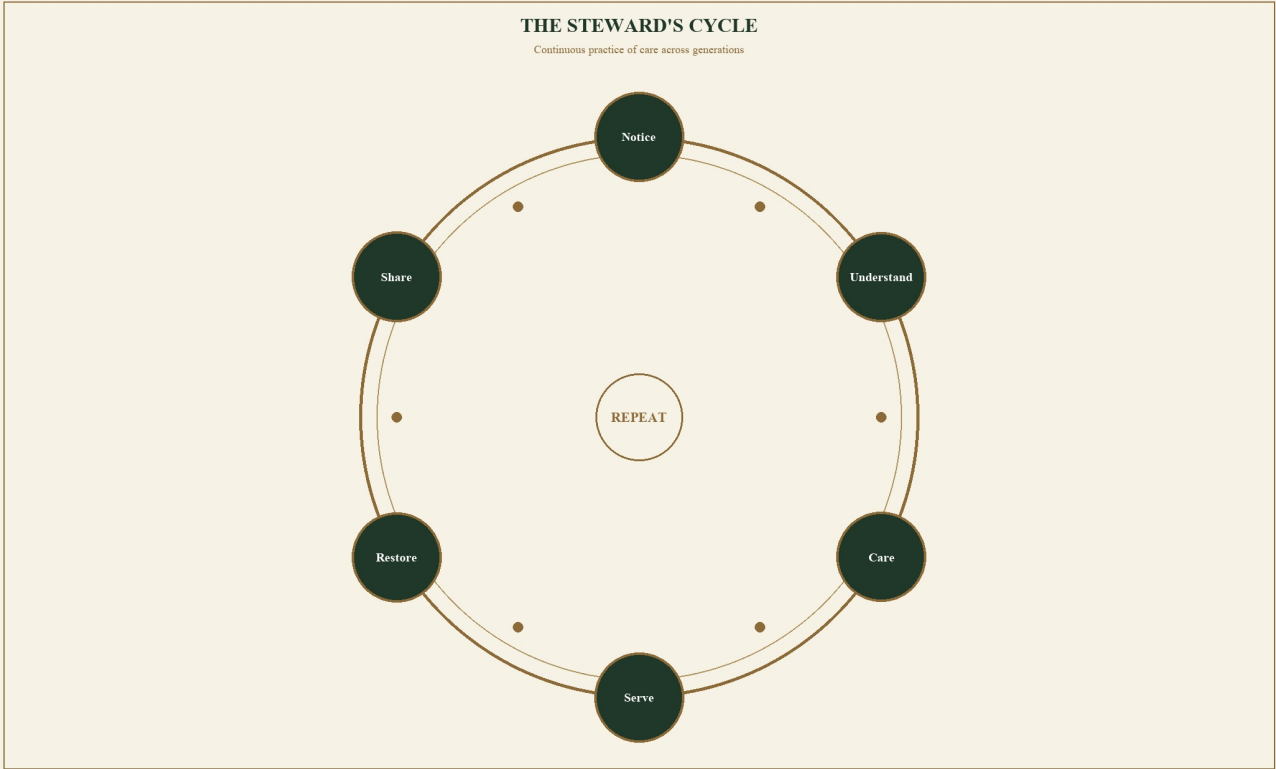

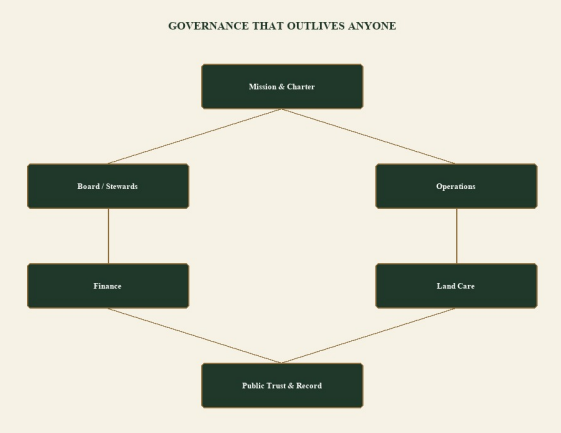


Figure · Institutional anatomy

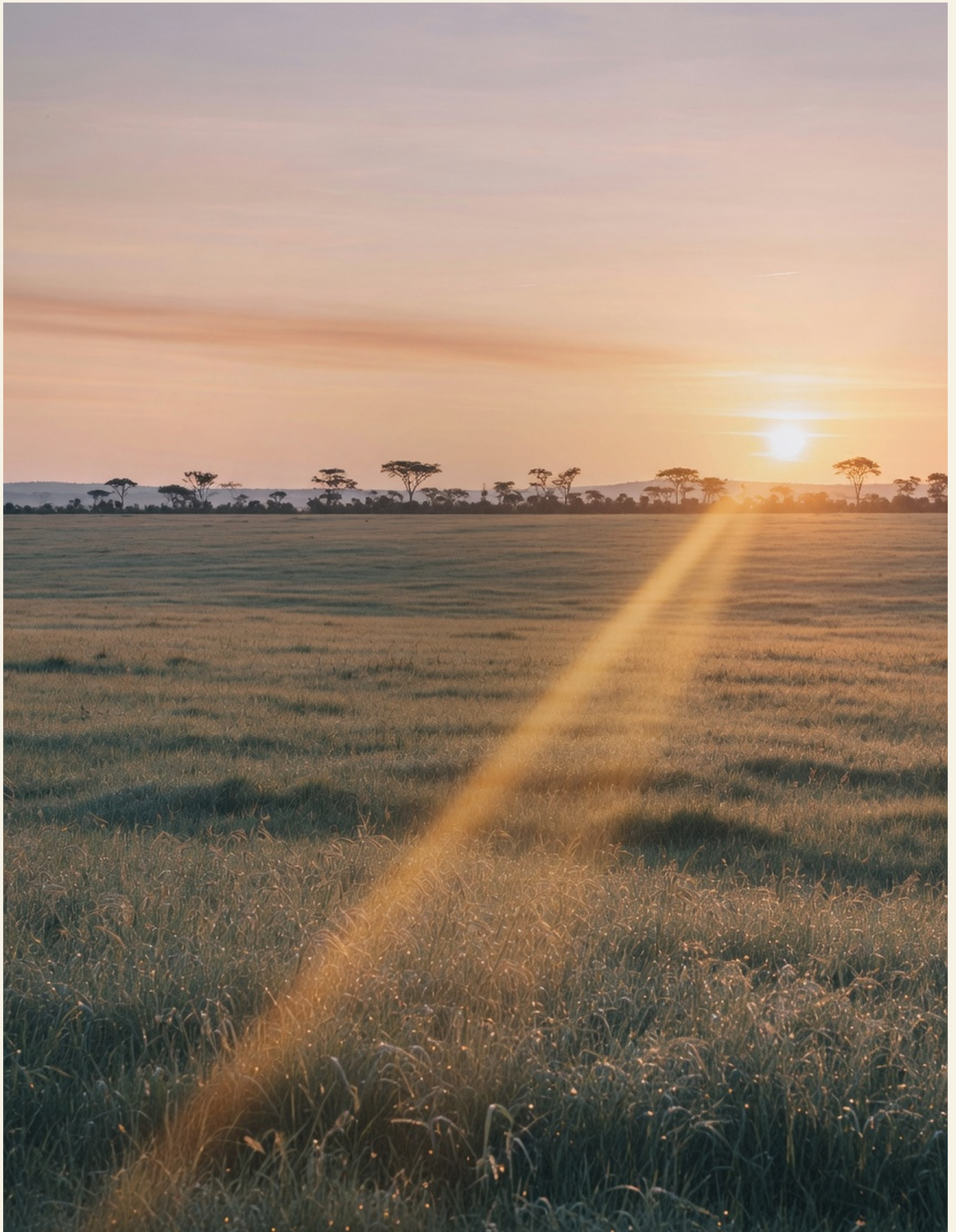

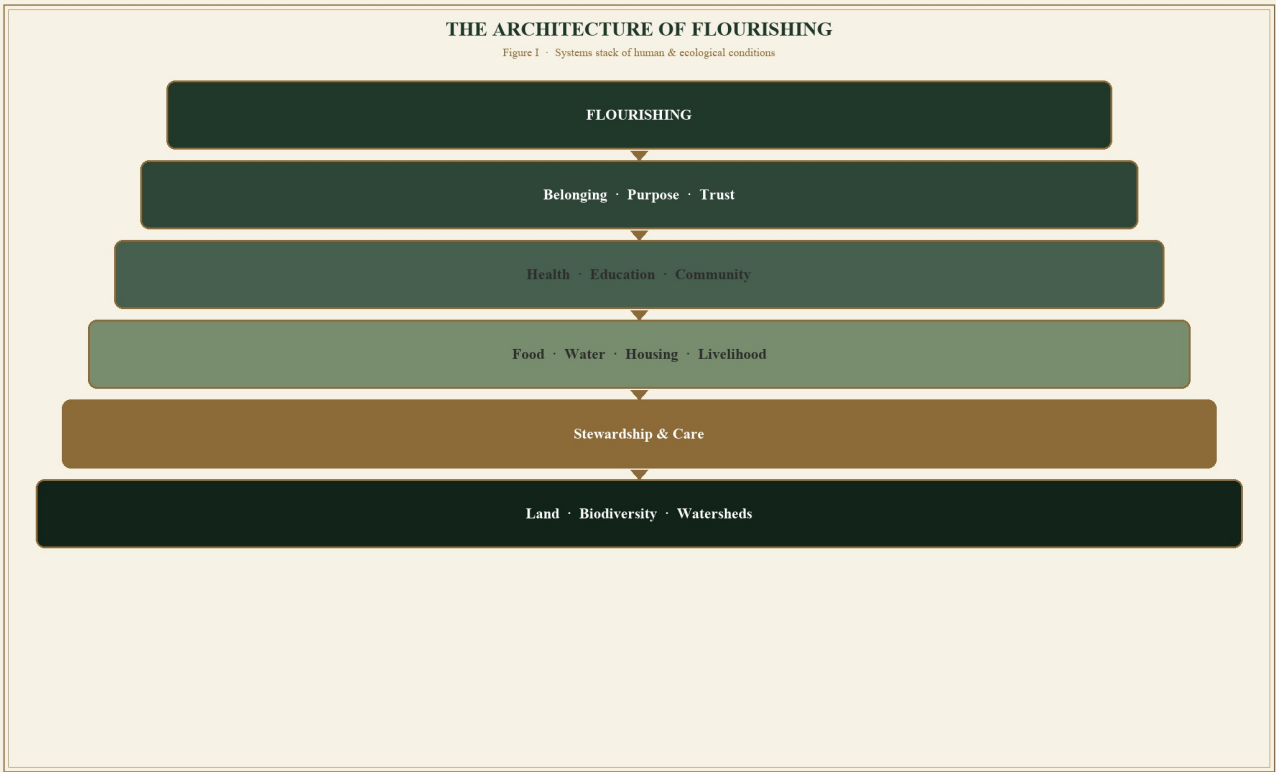
Healthy Systems

Healthy systems are rarely simple.

Land

Land is often measured in acres. Stewardship measures relationships.

Healthy landscapes provide services no engineered system can fully replicate.

Opening Essay

Land as Living Infrastructure

Pipelines. Buildings. Land is different. It already performs extraordinary work.

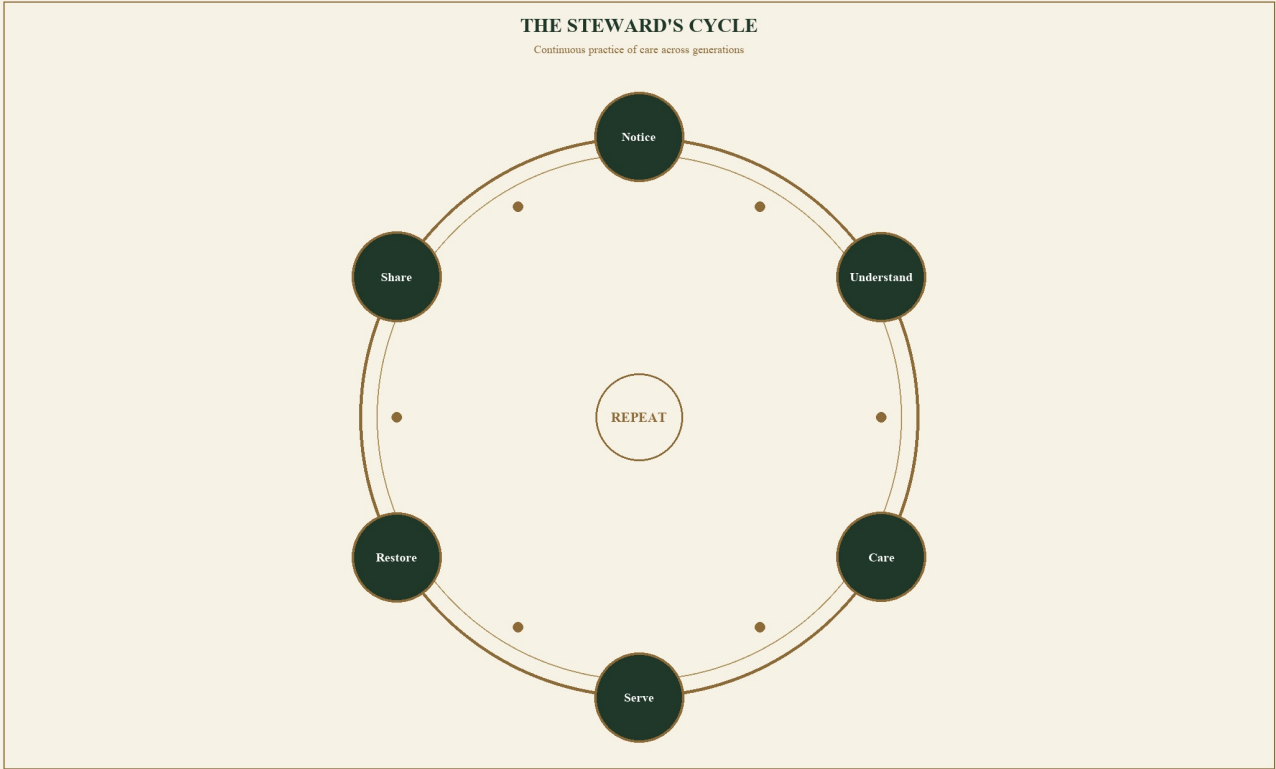


Figure · Continuous practice of care
