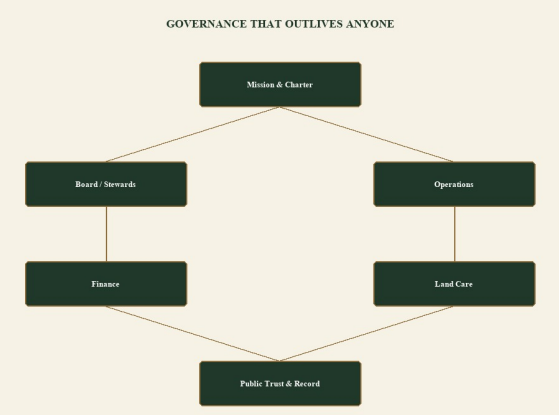


Figure · Institutional anatomy

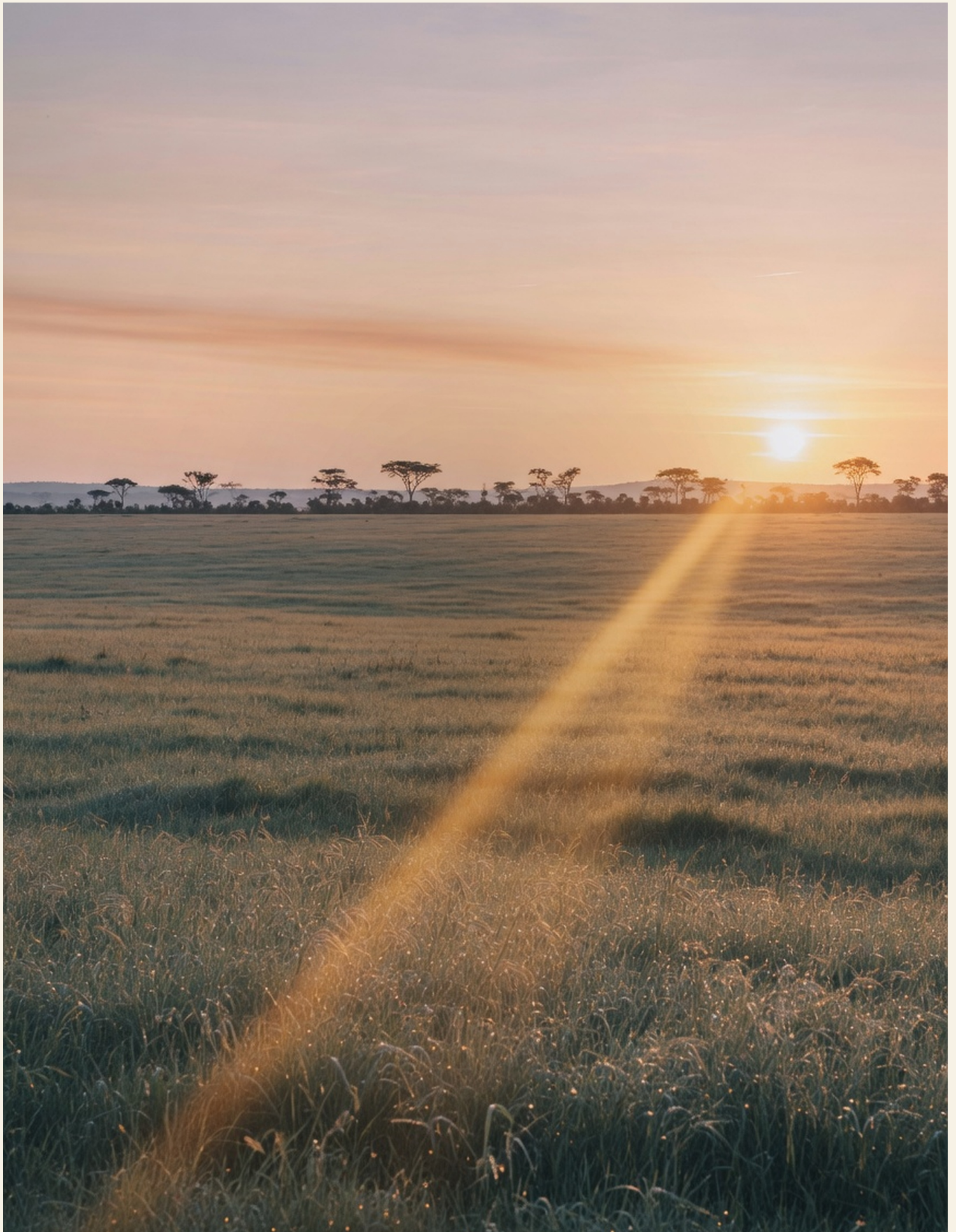

Purpose

This manual establishes how the Foundation makes decisions, accepts responsibility, documents its work, and remains accountable over generations.

Governance exists to protect the mission. Not personalities.

Institutional Purpose

The Foundation exists to cultivate the conditions in which people, communities, and the living world flourish together.

Every policy should support this purpose.

Core Responsibilities

Every steward commits to:

- Protect ecological integrity.
- Practice financial responsibility.
- Build public trust.
- Document decisions.
- Learn continuously.
- Think across generations.

Governance Philosophy

Authority is temporary. Stewardship is continuous.

Leadership serves the mission. The mission never serves leadership.

Institutions exist so that responsibility can outlive the people who first accepted it.

Board Responsibilities

The Board shall:

- Protect the mission.
- Approve long-term strategy.
- Oversee finances.
- Ensure legal compliance.
- Review conservation decisions.
- Evaluate executive leadership.
- Maintain institutional integrity.

Steward Responsibilities

Every steward agrees to:

- Tell the truth.
- Respect science.
- Protect living systems.
- Avoid conflicts of interest.
- Leave every place healthier than it was found.

Decision Framework

Every major decision should answer:

- ✓ Does this strengthen flourishing?
- ✓ Does it build trust?
- ✓ Is it financially responsible?
- ✓ Can it be stewarded long-term?
- ✓ Would future generations understand this decision?

If the answer is uncertain—pause, learn, listen, and improve. If more stewardship—not more speed—is required, choose care.

Land Acceptance Criteria

Future properties should be evaluated according to:

- Ecological significance
- Stewardship capacity
- Financial sustainability
- Educational value
- Community benefit
- Restoration potential
- Long-term legal protection

Land should never be accepted simply because it is available.

Financial Stewardship

Every dollar should support mission before expansion.

Budget priorities: Stewardship. Safety. Governance. Education. Restoration. Administration.

Growth follows capacity.

Transparency

Publish:

- Annual reports
- Financial summaries
- Conservation outcomes
- Governance updates
- Strategic priorities

Trust grows through openness. Documentation becomes institutional memory.

Ethics

The Foundation will not knowingly compromise its mission for funding, publicity, or convenience.

Integrity is non-negotiable.

Good governance protects both the mission and the people entrusted with carrying it forward.

Volunteers

Every volunteer deserves:

- Training
- Respect
- Safe working conditions
- Clear expectations
- Clear roles and safety guidance
- Meaningful work connected to the mission
- Recognition

Volunteers are fellow stewards. Stewardship becomes culture when participation becomes ordinary.

Partnerships

Healthy partnerships are based upon:

- Shared values
- Clear agreements
- Mutual respect
- Transparency
- Measurable outcomes

Not every opportunity is the right partnership.

Scientific Stewardship

Management decisions should be informed by:

- Ecological monitoring
- Best available science
- Local knowledge
- Adaptive management

Learning never stops.

Documentation

Maintain permanent records of:

- Board decisions
- Property files
- Stewardship plans
- Easements
- Restoration activities
- Annual monitoring
- Major agreements

Institutional memory protects future leaders.

Crisis Response

When uncertainty arises:

- Pause.
- Gather evidence.
- Consult experts.
- Document reasoning.
- Communicate honestly.

Stewardship values thoughtful decisions over rapid reactions.

The Steward's Standard

Every steward should ask:

If I were remembered only by this decision, would I be proud to leave it behind?

Institutional Promise

The Foundation promises to grow only as quickly as it can steward responsibly.

Scale will never replace quality.

Trust will never be sacrificed for speed.

Mission will always remain greater than expansion.
